

















If you are between the ages of 4 and 7 years old, use a booster seat every time.








As the Buckle family arrived home, Burt said, "Everyone out! It gets really hot in the car when it's sitting in the sun!"



You never know when a car will start moving. Walking or playing behind a car is dangerous! Always walk to the front of the car.




